the tead, the President Market a cou-ple of days to exho her sentiments. Others not took exception to the Russian's remarks. The Washington Post, undoubtedly smarting under his criticism of press irresponsibility, editorialized that Solzhenitsyn

teemed to have "a gross misunder-

seemed to have "a gross misunder-standing of Western society". Many of his critics attacked his person or his personality, since they found it hard to answer his specific charges. In some quarters he was dismissed as some sort of a pre-Belahevilk Bussian religious myeti-who simply hadn't lived in the free modal done enough, therefore who simply main i five in the free world long enough, therefore "couldn't know enough" about it. One critic dismissed him for being "curmudgeonly self-righteous" and likened him to the "Watergate seoundrels."

We read in Genesis 2 that God rested the seventh day and blessed and sanctified it Jesus taught that the Sabbath was made for man (Mark 2:27-28) at the time man'was made. Our booklet Which Day Is the Chris-tian Sabbath? explains how we know, which day it is that God calls the Sabbath and why it is important to

want to expound a bit on the meaning and purpose of the Sabbath and show why we have been given this God and how to make the Sabbath what God intended it to be — an opportunity to pursue some of the very highest ideals of human life.

God has told us that there are six day to labor and be concerned with material pursuits. But the and be concerned with material pursuits. but the Sabbath is a day of rest and freedom from the daily cares. The very fact that we're not pursuing our own material gains on this day makes it a delight. We are showing that we are not the slaves of materialism. We're not bent on packing, in as much money or as much of anything as we can possibly get.

Lesson from history

In Nahemiah 13, Judah was in trouble. They had gone into captivity Ezra, the great leader of God, brought them back into the land and now Nehemiah, a very vigorous, very forceful leader, was restoring and rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem once again. But the people were in a weakened spiritual condition.

And so in Nebemiah 13. "In those days I saw in

Judah men treading wine presses on the sabbath, Jugan men treating wine presses on the atopan, and bringing in heaps of grain and loading them on asses, and also, wine; grapes, figs, and all kinds of burdens, which they brought into Jerusalemon the sabbath day and I testified against them in the day which they sold provisions. There dwelt men of Tyre also for the city who brought fish, all kinds of ares and sold on the subbath day unto the chil-

dren of Judah
"Then I contended with the nobles of Judah." and said unto them. What evil thing is this that you do, and profane the sabbath day? And it came to puss, that when the gates of Jesusalem began to be dark before the subbath. I commanded that the gates should be shut, and charged that they should not beopened until after the subbath, and some of my servants set I at the gates, that there should no burden be brought in on the sabbath day. So the nerchants and sellers of all kinds of wares lodged outside of Jesusulem once or twice. Then I tes-tified against them, and said unto them, Why do you lodge before the wail? If you do so again, I will lay hands on you from that time forth came they no more on the abbath day. And I commanded the Levices that they about decame them selves, and that they should come and keep the gates, to sanctify the sabbath day." (verses 15-17, 19-22, paraphrased)

leans' example

Jesus also had a lot to say about the Sabbath day. Probably no past of His conduct was more criticized than His mode of observing the Sabath Let's book at a list of the charges that the thatrises leveled against Jesus regarding His Sabbath keeping. There are five tecorded incidents in which the Phariseos charged Jesus with breaking the Sabbath.

BING BUILDAD LEARNED GOD! PRINCIPLE OF SIN! I knew Ond said, "Sin is the transgression o law" — meaning God's laws. I had learned that there was the springrant law based on the principle of ourgoing EQVE: I had learned there were also physical laws God had set in motion in our human hidles to con-

up tour state of health I had learned, even at that carly stage of my knowledge of the smartual law is first of all ourgoing LOVE. Next it was magnified into the two Great magnified into the two creat Confunandments — love toward GODs and love toward human neighbor The Ten Command-ments, I knew mirely stated the broad PRINCIPLES of love toward. cop (the first four of the Ten), and love to fellowman (the last six Commandments).

But also I had learned one more VITALLY IMPORTANT BASIC PRINCIPLE. In II Corinthians 3:6 God through Paul began explaining that the ministers of the NEW Testament are ministers NOT of the strictness of the letter of the law, but of the SPERIT — that is, the obvious intent, meaning or principle involved.

I knew, for example, that the Ten Commandments explained only the general PRINCIPLE of the direction, attitude, and purpos

experience, a very vivid example what Paul was talking about in Il Corinthians 3: My elder daughter, then 9 years of age, was a rapid and inveterate reader. She had been bringing fiction "lovestory" books home from the school library. She would read an entire book in just two or three evenings. I had received a notes from her teacher.

I said to Beverly: "Your teacher has warned me that yo are injuring your eyes, and even perhaps your mind, by reading so much of this fiction and suggested I speak to you about it.
Therefore I am telling you not to bring any more of those fiction books home from the school li-

* The very next evening, I noticed Beverly reading a book and already about half way

through it.
"Beverly," I asked, "isn't that another lave-story fiction

"Yes, Daddy," she replied. "Yes, Daddy," she replied.
"Well, why are you disobeying
me, when I told you to stop reading such books?"
"Oh, I'm NOT disobeying
you, Daddy, You said, 'Don't
bring any paire of those books

My daughter obeyed the strict CETTER OF THE EAW -- but not its obvious intent and meaning -not in the PRINCIPLE involved the spirit of the law.

God's law defining sinto smoking What was the obvious intent meaning and principle of the law? It was the principle of outflowing LOVE/toward others, toward

God and toward neighbor I then asked myself, "wity do I smoke? Is it to express outgoing love to GOD?" Most assuredly NOT! "Am I smoking to express outpoing love and concern for the

welfare of other humans?" I had to answer in the negative. Often, I realized, smoking is obnoxious and objectionable to nonsmok-

ers. Then I asked myself, "Is it in-juitious to me?" It was not yet then known that smoking is a cause of lung cancer. But I knew well the function of the lungs to filter out impurities from the blood passing through the lungs returning to the heart. I did know that inhaling smoke into the lungs simply had to be harmful, at least in some degree.

I realized that the opposite to, or transgression of, the law of outgoing loans.

outgoing love to others was coveting or lust — inordinate self-desire

WHY, I finally asked myself then, do I smoke? It was a form of SELF-desire, breaking — at least in some measure — the Tenth Commandment!

In other words, God was showing me SMOKING WAS A SIN, even th a mild one! That was more than 51 years ago. I stopped smok-ing then and there

Now it had happened that my smoking was obnoxious to my wife. She had merely tolerated it

That is how the LIVING GOD SHOWED ME THAT SMOKING IS A SPIRITUAL SIN!

But what about being a physical sin — barming the physical laws that God set in operation in our bodies? We knyw now shar it is a cause of lung cancer, which can be fatal.

But I learned one point more Some 10 years after I had quit smoking, I made a test on myself. I was in Portland, Ore., doing a broadcast or making recordings.
On this particular trip my wife was not with me. I knew that if I on my clothes or in my breath. I tried an experiment

I bought a pack of cigarettes in my hotel room, removing all

my clothes and hanging them in the wardrobe closet with the door shut. I took out a cigarette and lit it. I wanted to learn how it would affect me after some 10 years of

nonsmoking.

After about two puffs, I felt purry all over. I felt definitely DREY all over. I telt dermitely that it was in violation of the natural law of cleanliness. I make took the third puff. It threw the clearette and the remainder of the pack into the toilet and flushed it. Then I took a shower so I would feel CLEAN again - and perhaps also so that my wife would not discern the telltale smell of it when I returned home in Eugene, where we then lived

That is how and with, when God had used me as His apostle in building His Church for this era of time, soon used me in pur into HIS CHURCH the truth that KMOKING IS, INDEED, A SIN EVEN though one may argue it is only a mild sin, yet Sin is sin and that does include smoking.

Other uses of tobacco fall, in principle and obvious intent of the law, in the same catagory!

Tobacco is a poison weed! I know because a duch digging laborer, working in front of our house when I was 5 years old, induced me to "take a chaw" of his chewing tobactor 1 swallowed at 1 fearned at age 5 that tobacco is a porson weed that can make you horribly sick, in can make you horribly sick in your stomach! I swore off chew. ing tobacco at age 51




