

AMARILLO Tes - Possible AMARILLO, Tex — Possible charges of religious discrimination may be filed against the Amarillo Independent School District if the district enforces a policy of limiting the number of religious holidays for which students may be excused from

school.

Jeffrey P Booth, pastor of the Amarillo Worldwide Church of God, which meets in the Beawer Citizens Center, 1311 S. Tyler, old school board members last aught the Church's Egal counsel is "prepared to fife suit if necessary to protect the rights of our children not to be penalized" for missing work because of absences for religious holidays. About 130 perents and children at tended last night's school board meeting.






